## 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan), Mumbai, a Society registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860 (Act XXX of 1860) was established on $9{ }^{\text {th }}$ August 1983. It is an autonomous organisation under the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India, New Delhi. The summary of major activities of the AYJNISHD(D), its Regional Centers (RCs) for the year 2018-19 are given below. As per the instructions of the Ministry, activities of Composite Regional Centers (CRCs) at Bhopal and Ahmedabad along with audited statement of accounts are also included.
> The Institute and its RCs served 40579 new clients, 74030 follow up clients and 259994 supports services provided at its clinics and through outreach and extension services against the target of 43483 new cases, 80522 follow up cases and 253000 support services.
> The Institute and its RCs distributed 10897 aids and appliances to 6770 beneficiaries comprising 4180 males, 2590 females, 3019 children and 1372 persons above the age of 60 years under ADIP scheme. Institute held 88 camps under ADIP scheme (for details refer Chapter-8).
> Under the long term training programme, the Institute and its RCs enrolled 380 candidates in various courses, and under the short term training programmes the Institute conducted 66 programmes for 4286 beneficiaries.
> The Institute has Disability Information Line (DIL) - an IVRS based 24 hours telephonic service for the Persons with Disabilities in 18 states in India. During the reporting year DIL received 83574 calls as compared to 77621 calls received during the year 2017-18.
> The Institute issued 635 letters in Hindi and 1827 in English. Total 304 documents were issued in bilingual under Official Language Act 1963 Section 3 (3).
> Government of Maharashtra approved AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai to issue hearing disability certificate from August, 2016. During the year of reporting 398 persons were issued hearing disability certificates.
> 735 children with hearing disability have been benefitted with Cochlear Implantation including 572 under ADIP and 163 under CSR funds during the year 2018-19. 14 additional hospitals were empanelled in the reporting year in addition to 172 hospitals empanelled in the previous years for Cochlear Implant surgeries across the country.
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> To support the NGOs in North Eastern Region the Institute provided clinical equipments, mini libraries and Information Kiosks to NGOs working in the area of disability rehabilitation to strengthen them (for details refer Chapter-9) as per the recommendations of the respective State Commissioners of Persons with Disabilities.
> The centrally air-conditioned library of AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai can accommodate sixty Library Readers. It has 17704 reading material including 1058 Hindi books, 1385 bound issues of back volumes of journals.
> Certificate Course in Computer Software for Persons with Hearing Impairment affiliated to Maharashtra State Board of Vocational Education and Examination was introduced during the reporting year.
> The Institute is implementing 'Vayoshree Scheme' which was launched by Shri Thaawar Chand Gehlot, Hon'ble Union Cabinet Minister, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India during his visit to the Institute on 26th April, 2019. The Scheme for providing physical Aids and Assisted-living Devices for Senior Citizens belonging to BPL category.
> The Yoga Meditation Center specifically dedicated for the benefit of staff and students of the Institute was inaugurated by Smt. Shakuntala D. Gamlin, Secretary and Smt. Dolly Chakrabarty, Joint Secretary, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment, Govt. of India, New Delhi on 12th February, 2019 at Mumbai.
> The CRC, Bhopal served 3697 new clients and 14157 follow up clients at the Center and through camps. The Center distributed and fitted 657 aids and appliances to 467 beneficiaries.
> The CRC, Ahmedabad served 1827 new clients and 5428 follow up clients at the Center and through camps. The Center distributed and fitted 271 aids and appliances to 154 beneficiaries.
> In the TCAD-Boys Town collaborated training Center 59 students with hearing impairment were undergoing various technical training during the reporting year.

## 3. THE INSTITUE, ITS CENTERS \& ACTIVITIES



Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan) [AYJNISHD(D)], a Society registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860 (Act XXX of 1860) was established on 9th August 1983. It is an autonomous organisation under the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India, New Delhi. The Institute is located at K.C. Marg, Bandra Reclamation, Bandra (West), Mumbai - 400 050, on a land area of 19324 sq. mt . and plinth area of 6624 sq. mt .

### 3.1 Mission

The Memorandum of Association of AYJNISHD(D) has the following aims and objectives:

* To conduct, sponsor, coordinate or subsidize research into all aspects of education and rehabilitation of the persons with hearing handicap.
* To undertake, sponsor, coordinate or subsidize research into biomedical engineering leading to the effective evaluation of aids or suitable surgical or medical procedures or development of new aids.
* To undertake or sponsor the training of trainees, teachers, employment officers, psychologists, vocational counsellors and such other personnel as may be deemed necessary by the Institute for promoting education, training and rehabilitation of the persons with hearing handicap.

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* To distribute or promote or subsidize the manufacture of prototypes and distribution of any or all aids designed to promote any aspect of education, rehabilitation and therapy for persons with hearing handicap.

2) Regional Center, Noida was established in 1986. It is functioning at NIEPID Building, Plot No.44-A, Block -C, Sector -40, Gautam Budh Nagar, Noida -201 303.
3) Regional Center, Secunderabad was established in 1986. It is functioning in its own building adjacent to NIEPID Campus at Manovikas Nagar, Bowenpally, Secunderabad-500 009.

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4) Regional Center, Janla was established in 1986 in collaboration with the Government of Odisha. It is functioning in its own building at Janla, Dist. Khurda, Odisha - 752054.
5) Composite Regional Center (CRC), Bhopal is a service model initiated by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment, Govt. of India, established on 14th August 2000. The Center is functioning under the administrative control of AYJNISHD(D) since February 2006. It is functioning in its own building at Punarvas Bhawan, Khajuri Kalan Road, Post - Piplani, Bhopal - 462021.
6) Composite Regional Center (CRC), Ahmedabad, Gujarat was established on 16th August 2011 and functioning under the administrative control of AYJNISHD(D). It is functioning in the building allotted by Govt. of Gujarat at Bhikshuk Gruh Campus, G.I.D.C., Odhav, Ahmedabad - 382415.

## 4. SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS 2030 : AN OVERVIEW

The United Nations 2030 Agenda for a Sustainable Development, to which India is a signatory pledges to 'leave no one behind'. The agenda has a specific thrust that member states strive to achieve a peaceful and prosperous world, where every individual matters and matters equally, so the dignity of an individual person and equality among all is implied across the three pillars of the work of the United Nations namely Development, Human Rights and Peace and Security. It is therefore critical for all the signatory nations to ensure, in this regard, the full and equal participation of persons with disabilities in all spheres of society and create enabling environments by, for and with persons with disabilities, in line with the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

The first flagship report of United Nations on Disability and the Sustainable Development Goals released in 2018 underlines 'Realization of the Sustainable Development Goals by, for and with persons with disabilities'. The report demonstrates that persons with disabilities are at a distinct disadvantage regarding most Sustainable Development Goals. It stresses that nations need to undertake concrete action to include the world's one billion persons with disabilities i.e. the $15 \%$ of the world population - as both agents and beneficiaries of development. Hence identifying good practices and urgent actions are suggested to be taken for the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals by, for and with persons with disabilities by 2030. The report expresses a concern that persons with disabilities continue to face numerous barriers to their full inclusion and participation resulting into disproportionate levels of poverty, lack of access to education, health services and employment.

## Ending poverty and hunger for all persons with disabilities (SDGs 1 and 2)

The UN report on disability states that persons with disabilities living under the national or international poverty line is higher, and in some countries double, than that of persons without disabilities. About $80 \%$ of them in some countries do not receive welfare schemes. The Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment however has shown great efforts in this regards by designing social protection policies and programmes, removal of barriers for fully benefitting from social protection on an equal basis with others and improve financial accessibility.

## Ensuring healthy lives and promoting well-being (SDG 3)

It is highlighted that access to health-care services remains a challenge for persons with disabilities as $50 \%$ of them are more than three times as likely to be unable to get health care when they need it. Amongst the proactive steps the Indian Government is in the process of undertaking proactive steps to identify and minimize the barriers to health care and also train health care personnel on disability inclusion and improve service delivery for persons with disabilities.

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## Ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education (SDG 4)

Globally persons with disabilities remain less likely to attend school and complete primary education and more likely to be illiterate than persons without disabilities as per the UN report as $54 \%$ of persons with disabilities compared to $77 \%$ of persons without disabilities are literate. In line with the UNCRPD, the RPWD (2016) and the RTE (2012) so also the Draft National Policy (2019) has undertaken stupendous efforts for ensuring access to quality education for all persons with disabilities. This is done by building capacity of teachers and enhancing knowledge on disability inclusion in education. The schools and educational facilities in higher education are being enables for creating an environment for students with disabilities and adopt a learner-centered pedagogy which acknowledges that everyone has unique needs that can be accommodated through a continuum of teaching approaches.

## Achieving gender equality and empowering all women and girls with disabilities (SDG 5)

Through the available data the UN reports that the women with disabilities are three times more likely to have unmet needs for health care; three times more likely to be illiterate; two times less likely to be employed and two times less likely to use the Internet. The same is with respect to employment. Towards achieving gender equality and empowering women and girls with disabilities, efforts are being taken in the Indian policies and programmes.

## Promoting full and productive employment and decent work for persons with disabilities (SDG 8)

The UN report has highlighted that the employment to population ratio of persons with disabilities aged 15 and older is almost half that of persons without disabilities and employed persons with disabilities tend to earn lower wages than their counterparts without disabilities. In India to improve the employment situation of persons with disabilities an assured quota to oblige employers to hire a certain number or percentage of persons with disabilities, have been adopted apart from promoting work place accessibility. Other measures include mainstreaming vocational education to include persons with disabilities, entrepreneurship and skill development training micro financing for persons with disabilities. A great effort is to facilitate job retention and return to work for persons who acquire a disability, including for persons with mental health conditions.

## Increasing access to information and communications technology (SDG 9)

Taking cognizance that persons with disabilities have more limited access to information and communications technology (ICT) than persons without disabilities. The UN report directs nations to reduce the gap between the haves and the have not's. In India the National policies programmes and Acts have been developed to promote equal access to ICT for persons with disabilities, including captioning or signing of television programmes, ensuring accessible government websites, accessible public electronic kiosks and automated teller machines and provision of telephone services for persons who have hearing loss and or speech impaired.

## Reducing inequality (SDG 10)

The UN report is concerned that persons with disabilities face persistent inequality in social, economic and political spheres and are disadvantaged in all areas covered by the SDGs. The same is however well safe guarded in the constitutional provisions of various Articles and Directive principles.

## Making cities and communities inclusive and sustainable for persons with disabilities (SDG 11)

The transportation systems, public spaces and facilities and businesses are not always accessible for persons with disabilities, reports the UN flagship report on disabilities. As in many nations more than 30\% of persons with disabilities find transportation and public spaces not accessible it is urged to address the issue on priority. In Indian context both Governmental and Non Governmental sectors have been putting efforts to raise-awareness and sharing knowledge on good practices and build capacity to implement measures promoting accessibility and inclusion where persons with disabilities are included without discrimination and can participate equally in the communities.

## Increasing the availability of disaggregated data by disability (SDG target 17)

Many of the United Nations entities have been working on practices to improve the quality of disability statistics worldwide. The World Health Organization (WHO) supports countries to collect data on disability and functioning through the model disability survey. The Washington Group on Disability Statistics developed a short set of disability questions and an extended set of questions on functioning for the identification of persons with disabilities, as well. In India the efforts have been to collect, process, analyze and disseminate data about disability by including it in various National sample surveys and in Census.

The executive summary and the details of activities presented in this annual report are based on the vision and mission of $\operatorname{AYJNISHD}(\mathrm{D})$ and its commitment of various national and international legislations, frameworks and goals.

## 5. HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai and its Regional Centers at Kolkata, Secunderabad, Noida and Janla, Odisha conducts Doctoral, Postgraduate, Graduate, Undergraduate and Diploma level courses and certificate vocational courses affiliated to respective universities in the concerned State/Directorate of Technical Education/ITI and recognised by Rehabilitation Council of India, New Delhi. Details of the courses being conducted are given below. The Number of students enrolled course wise is given in Appendix -I.

### 5.1. Long Term Training Programmes

## Courses at AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai

1. Ph.D. Programmes: AYJNISHD(D) has been recognized by the Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik to conduct Ph. D. programme in the discipline of Audiology \& Speech-Language Pathology and by the Mumbai University in the discipline of Special Education. At present total, 41candidates are persuing Ph. D. in these disciplines.
2. Master of Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology: This two-year postgraduate course is affiliated to Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik. During the reporting year,19 candidates were enrolled and 18 candidates passed out as compared to 13 number of candidates in the previous year.
3. Master of Education (Hearing Impairment) : This two-year postgraduate course is affiliated to Mumbai University. During the reporting year, 10 candidates were enrolled and 3 candidates passed out as compared to the same number of candidates in the previous year.
4. Bachelor of Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology : This four-year undergraduate course is affiliated to Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Nashik. During the reporting year,37 candidates were enrolled and 31 candidates passed out as compared to 28 candidates in the previous year.
5. Bachelor of Education (Hearing Impairment) : This two-year graduate course is affiliated to Mumbai University. During the reporting year 9 candidates were enrolled and 11 candidates passed out as compared to 10 number of candidates in the previous year.
6. Certificate Course in Computer Software (for Persons with Hearing Impairment) : This one-year Certificate course is affiliated to Maharashtra State Board of Vocational Education and Examination, Mumbai. During the reporting year, 14 candidates were enrolled and 9 candidates passed out.
7. The Institute also conducts Certificate Course in Basic Animation for Persons with Hearing Impairment affiliated to Maharashtra State Board of Vocational Education and Examination, Mumbai. During the reporting year, 7 candidates were trained.
8. National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) Programme : AYJNISHD(D) is accredited as Special Accredited Institution for Education for the Disadvantaged (SAIED) Center and provides continued education for the students with a disability, who are dropouts from either mainstream or special schools. During the

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reporting year 21 candidates with Learning Disability, two candidates with ASD, one orthopedically handicapped, two candidate with cerebral palsy, three multiple handicapped, 11 candidates with intellectually disabled, one candidate with visual impairment and 11 typical candidates were enrolled. During the reporting year, 40 candidates successfully completed the NIOS secondary examination.

## Courses at Regional Center, Kolkata

1. Master of Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology : This two-year postgraduate course is affiliated to West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata. During the reporting year, 15 candidates were enrolled and 7 candidates passed out as compared to 4 candidates in the previous year.
2. Bachelor of Education (Hearing Impairment) : This two-year graduate course is affiliated to West Bengal State University, Kolkata. During the reporting year, 13 candidates were enrolled and 12 candidates passed out as compared to 16 number of candidates in the previous year.
3. Bachelor of Education (Hearing Impairment - Distance Mode) : This two-year graduate course is affiliated to Netaji Subhas Open University, Kolkata. During the reporting year, 9 candidates were enrolled and 17 candidates passed out as compared to 3 candidates in the previous year.
4. Bachelor of Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology : This four-year undergraduate course is affiliated to West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata. During the reporting year,30 candidates were enrolled and 23 candidates passed out as compared to 19 number of candidates in the previous year.
5. Diploma in Education (Special Education - Deaf \& Hard of Hearing) : This two-year course is affiliated to RCI, New Delhi. During the reporting year, 16 candidates were enrolled and 10 candidates passed out as compared to 21 candidates in the previous year.
6. Diploma in Sign Language Interpreter Course : This one-year diploma course is affiliated to RCI, New Delhi. During the reporting year, 4 candidates were enrolled and 2 candidates passed out as compared to 7 number of candidates in the previous year.
7. Diploma in Computer Application : This one-year Diploma course for persons with hearing disabilities affiliated to WEBEL Informatics Ltd. During the reporting year, 17 candidates enrolled and 15 candidates passed as compared to 17 candidates in the previous year.

## Courses at Regional Center, Secunderabad

1. Master of Science (Audiology, Speech-Language Pathology): This two-year postgraduate course is affiliated to Osmania University. During the reporting year, 12 candidates were enrolled and 15 number of candidates passed out as compared to the same number of candidates in the previous year.
2. Bachelor of Science (Audiology, Speech-Language Pathology) : This four-year undergraduate course is affiliated to Osmania University. During the reporting year, 31 candidates were enrolled and 28 candidates passed out as compared to 29 candidates in the previous year.

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3. Bachelor of Education (Special Education - Hearing Impairment) : This two-year graduate course is affiliated to Osmania University. During the reporting year 6 candidates were enrolled for this course.
4. Diploma in Education (Special Education - Deaf \& Hard of Hearing) : This one-year course is affiliated to RCI, New Delhi. During the reporting year, 4 candidates were enrolled and 24 candidates passed out as compared to 21 candidates in the previous year.

## Courses at Regional Center, Noida

1. Bachelor of Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology: This four year undergraduate course is affiliated to G. G. Indraprastha University. During the reporting year 21 candidates were enrolled and 23 candidates passed out as compared to the same number of candidates in the previous year.
2. Diploma in Education (Special Education - Deaf \& Hard of Hearing) : This two year course is affiliated to RCI, New Delhi. During the reporting year 29 candidates were enrolled and 25 number of candidates were passed out.
3. Diploma in Sign Language Interpreter Course : This one year diploma course is affiliated to RCI, New Delhi. During the reporting year 8 candidates were enrolled and 4 number of candidates were passed out.
4. Certificate Course in Computer Application for Persons with Hearing Impairment : This one year course is affiliated to National Institute of Open Schooling. During the reporting year 10 candidates were enrolled and 7 candidates passed out as compared to 8 candidates in the previous year.

## Courses at Regional Center, Janla, Odisha

1. Bachelor of Education (Special Education - Hearing Impairment) : This two-year graduate course is affiliated to Utkal University. During the reporting year, 30 candidates were enrolled for this course.
2. Diploma in Education (Special Education - Deaf \& Hard of Hearing) : This two-year course is affiliated to RCI, New Delhi. During the reporting year, 7 candidates were enrolled and 28 candidates passed out as compared to the same number of candidates in the previous year.
3. Diploma in Hearing, Language and Speech : This one year course is affiliated to RCI, New Delhi. During the reporting year, 29 candidates were enrolled and 4 number of candidates were passed out.

### 5.2. Short-Term Training Programmes

In addition to the Long Term Training Programmes, the Institute also conducts Short Term Training Programmes for the professionals in the area of disability rehabilitation, academic personnel, parents of children with hearing impairment, media professionals, GOs \& NGOs.


During the reporting year, 66 short term training programmes to different target groups as given below were conducted by the Institute and its Regional Centers for 4286 beneficiaries in comparison to 84 programmes for 5632 beneficiaries during the year 2017-18.

## 6. RESEARCH AND PUBLICATIONS

Research projects have been designed to increase and improve the quality of rehabilitation services. The projects are aimed at evolving service modules and diagnostic tests that can be used or replicated by other organisations. Modules for early identification and intervention of children with hearing impairment have been prepared and are on the field trial.

System : The Academic Committee is constituted as required under the bye-laws of the Institute. The members are approved by the Executive Council of the Institute. All the projects and academic activities of the Institute are placed before the Academic Committee, including the request for extension of projects. The report of the completed projects is also examined by the Committee.

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## 7. SERVICES



The Institute provides comprehensive diagnostic, therapeutic, educational and vocational services to persons with speech and/or hearing disabilities. As a training and research Institute, the services are rendered in the best possible way to meet the needs of both rural as well as urban clients. An interdisciplinary team of audiologists, speech-language pathologists, special educators, psychologists, social workers, vocational counsellors, ENT specialists, paediatricians and neurologists maintain a high standard of rehabilitation services like:

* Evaluation and diagnosis of hearing, speech and language impairment
* Selection and fitting of hearing aids and ear moulds
* Psychological evaluation
* Educational evaluation services
* Psychotherapy and behaviour therapy
* Parent guidance and counselling
* Pre-school
* Referral and follow-up
* Outreach and extension services
* Parent Infant Programme
* Vocational training \& placement
* Speech \& language therapy


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The Institute provides information and documentation facilities and distributes public education material in the areas of prevention, early identification, early intervention, parent training and use of hearing aid, etc. During the year under report, the Institute served 40579 new cases, 74030 follow up cases and 259994 support services provided at its Headquarter (HQ) and Regional Centers (RCs) and also at camps when compared to 36907 new cases, 74621 follow up cases and 244424 support services provided during the year 2017-18. Details are shown in Appendix - III.


### 7.1 Hearing Assessment \& Hearing Aid Fitting

State of the art technology is used for assessment of hearing and hearing aid fitting. All age group persons including new-born and infants are tested for their hearing acuity. Miniature hearing aids: behind-the-ear are also tested and fitted to the eligible persons. The Institute implements the Scheme of Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase/Fitting of Aids \& Appliances (ADIP) of the Government of India, by way of providing hearing aids and custom made earmoulds
 free of cost to the needy.


During the reporting year, 49401 number of persons underwent audiological evaluations as compared to 39954 persons during the year 2017-18. Further 10897 hearing aids were fitted and 11338 earmoulds were prepared during the year 2018-19 as compared to 16815 hearing aids and 8638 earmoulds during the year 2017-18 (details given in Appendix - III).

The Institute is also implementing "Vayoshree" Scheme of Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India to provide hearing aids to elderly persons belonging to BPL categories.

### 7.2 Issue of Hearing Disability Certificate

Govt. of Maharashtra approved AYJNISHD(D) as an authorised center for the issue of hearing disability certificate vide its order dated $17^{\text {th }}$ July, 2016. Following is the recognised board to issue hearing disability certificate.

During the reporting year, the Institute issued 398 hearing disability certificates to persons with hearing impairment in comparison to 782 certificates in the previous year.

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### 7.3 Speech \& Language Assessment \& Therapy



Facilities to assess the speech and linguistic proficiency of the speech and hearing disabled have been developed and used. Computer- assisted assessment and intervention facilities are available. Nevertheless, the packages focusing on home-based intervention and parent training programme are also well developed and utilized. During the year under report, the number of cases registered for speech \& language evaluation and for speech therapy sessions was 9725 \& 40598, respectively as compared to 8555 \& 35478, respectively during the year 2017-18 (details are given in Appendix - III).

### 7.4 Psychological Assessment \& Therapy



Diagnostic services like developmental assessment, intelligence testing, personality assessment, neuropsychological testing and human resource assessment are provided. The psycho-therapeutic services include a variety of psycho-therapies, guidance and counselling and psycho-educational intervention. During the year under report 3061 new cases were registered for psychological evaluation, guidance and counselling as compared to 3034 registered during the year 2017-18 (details given in Appendix-III).

### 7.5 Educational Guidance

The Institute provided guidance on various aspects of education to 8728 parents of children with hearing impairment during the year 2018-19 as compared to 7154 parents of children with hearing impairment during the year 2017-18 (details given in Appendix-III).


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## Pre-School Programme

The pre-school programme trains children with hearing impairment in 3-6 year age range. Under this programme AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai enrolled 16 children, RC Secunderabad 4, RC Noida 54, RC Kolkata 68 and RC Janla 33, totalling 175 children during the reporting year.

### 7.6 Socio-Economic Rehabilitation Services

Persons with hearing impairment are offered services by the Institute's Socio-Economic Rehabilitation Department and Regional Centers by assessing the employability, providing vocational counselling and giving career guidance and placement services.

The Institute also conducts vocational training for the persons with hearing impairment in collaboration with voluntary organizations and orientation training to Vocational Counsellors, Placement Officers, Personnel Officers, Rehabilitation Officers and Social Workers.
 Computer training programmes are also conducted for persons with hearing impairment at AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai and its Regional Centers. During the reporting year, the Institute started two new courses viz. Computer Software and Basic Animation affiliated to Maharashtra State Board of Vocational Education and Examination at Mumbai. The Institute has initiated the online referral services for employment against the vacancies reserved for persons with hearing disability.

### 7.7 Information and Documentation Services

Information and Documentation Services effectively link AYJNISHD(D) and its beneficiaries directly and indirectly. Its objectives are acquisition, assimilation and dissemination of information to individuals and organisations working in the area of hearing impairment. The activities of the Information and Documentation Center are given below.

### 7.7.1 Computer Section

Computer Center facilitates computerization process by development of software needed for activities of the Institute, identifying and recommending suitable ready-made software packages, recommending suitable hardware, coordinating internet services and hardware maintenance services, providing training to staff as and when needed and providing help and support in data processing work. Following software are installed for various activities -

1. Software for clinical services to PWDs
2. SOUL software for automation of library services
3. Tally-ERP software for accounting work at HQ, RCs, CRCs and TCAD
4. eTDS for tax calculation
5. Software for pay and related work which is developed in-house.
6. Software for result preparation, mark list and certificate for courses conducted by RCI
7. Online admission system for various courses run by the Institute.

Internet service is made available in the library, hostel and in all the departments. Security software is in place.

The Institute's website - ayjnihh.nic.in is maintained by this Section. The website provides details of the services and activities of the Institute. The website also provides exhaustive information on speech, hearing impairment and rehabilitation. It has information about various aspects of early identification, prevention, diagnosis, intervention and assistance to persons with hearing impairment and their families. News and event details are frequently being updated on the website.

Computer Center coordinates Biometric Attendance system and support e-procurement process. To provide support to Cochlear Implant Services, a website - adipcochlearimplant.in is maintained by this Section.

### 7.7.2 Library



The centrally air-conditioned library of AYJNISHD(D) can accommodate sixty Library Readers. It has 17704 reading material including 1058 Hindi books, 1385 bound issues of back volumes of journals. The Institute has subscribed 18 multi-site online e-journals for HQ \& RCs and 155 open access journals, which reduced the cost and space required to store hard copies. Internet and wifi facility is made available to staff and students of AYJNISHD(D) to access Digital Library of AYJNISHD(D) and e-resources (N-LIST) of the library. The reprography facility is available during working hours of the Institute for staff, students and research scholars.

### 7.7.3 Disability Information Line (DIL)

Disability Information Line (DIL) is an IVRS based telephonic information service to provide information on disabilities. Disability-related information on Causes, Prevention, Diagnosis, Intervention/Treatment, Aids \& Appliances, Education, Employment, Service providers list, Government Schemes \& Concessions are available through DIL Service. To provide state-specific information and to provide local language support, DIL Servers have been installed in different regions of India. Disability Information Line Service is accessible round the clock and service of Call attendant is also available during working hours. During the reporting year, DIL received 83574 calls as compared to 77621 calls in the year 2017-18. Details of Disability Information Line (DIL) locations are given below -

## 8. IMPLEMENTATION OF ADIP SCHEME

It has been the constant endeavor of the Government of India to provide persons with disabilities, aids and appliances at minimum costs. The requirement for providing aids and appliances, which are essential for the social, economical and vocational rehabilitation of persons with disabilities, has come into sharp focus, particularly after the enactment of the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995, which came into force in 1996 and presently replaced by Right of Persons with Disability Act, 2016.

Disability restricts one's opportunities for leading functionally productive lives. From the application of modern technology, there have emerged a number of aids, which can reduce the effects of disabilities and enhance the economic potential of the persons with disabilities. To illustrate, a wheel chair, an artificial limb, crutch, a brace, a splint can greatly improve the mobility of physically disabled individual. Similarly, with the help of modern hearing aids, persons with residual hearing can be helped to carry on many activities of daily living. Cochlear Implants provide opportunity to persons with hearing disability to hear and learn to speak.

## The Scheme and its Objectives

The main objective of the Scheme is to assist needy persons with disabilities in procuring durable, sophisticated and scientifically manufactured, modern, standard aids and appliances that can promote their physical, social and psychological rehabilitation, by reducing the effects of disabilities and enhancing their economic potential. Under this scheme the Institute and its regional centers distribute hearing aids at its centers and also through camps as a part of outreach and extension service activity. The details of ADIP grant in aid released and the statement of expenditure and also the details of beneficiaries under this scheme during the year 2018-19 is given below -

### 8.2 COCHLEAR IMPLANT: EMPOWERING PERSONS WITH HEARING DISABILITY USING MODERN TECHNOLOGY UNDER ADIP SCHEME\& CSR INITIATIVE

AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai is the Nodal Agency for implementing Cochlear Implant (CI) surgery as well as post-surgical rehabilitation for children with hearing disability as per the revised ADIP scheme guidelines of Cochlear Implant, 2014. Loss of hearing impacts child's development of language and speech. The impact is much more severe if the loss is since birth. Such children having severe to profound hearing loss, even after the use of appropriate hearing aids, do not benefit from amplification and fail to develop speech and language.

Cochlear Implant is a surgical procedure where the internal device consisting of receiver-stimulator and electrodes is implanted in the skull and fine electrodes are inserted in the cochlea. This is done by the experienced ENT surgeons. After the surgical wound heals (takes 10 to 15 days), the external part of implant known as the processor is switched on. The switch-on is a process of synchronizing the external processor with the internal electrodes using computers.

After the surgery and switch-on, it is important to provide speech-language therapy by trained professionals such as Speech-Language Pathologists, Special Educators for children with hearing impairment or Auditory Verbal Therapists so that children develop normal speech and language. This technology reverses the trend that deaf is "dumb". With this technology, deaf too can speak like any of us. Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment, Govt. of India started providing Cochlear Implant under ADIP Scheme from the year 2014.

Subsequently, 186 hospitals ( 38 in 2014-15, 84 in 2015-16, 18 in 2016-17, 32 in 2017-18 and 14 in 2018-19) around the country have been empanelled for Cochlear Implant surgery and 1488 surgeries ( 38 in 2014-15, 300 in 2015-16, 276 in 2016-17, 302in 2017-18 and 572 in 2018-19) have been completed and rehabilitation has started. Presently at the age of 8 years, 3 years post implant, she is able to speak clearly in sentences. She also asks questions and interacts with everyone. She is attending regular school and parents are happy to see her improvement.

## MR. ABU MUCHHA..... AN INSPIRATION



Life was not a bed of roses for the little Abu Muchha. At the very dawn of his life, when he was just nine, Abu's parents realized that their child was slipping into a world of silence. Finally life denied him the opportunity to enjoy the songs of sounds that played around him. Abu's hearing impairment forced him to quit his school. Abu bore this whimsical whip of our society stoically but hugged his desire for education close to his heart. His passing Madhyamik in the year 2002 gave him the strength to conquer the gloom of his life and he went ahead to train himself in soft toy making, fashion designing and financial management. Thus, Abu managed to overcome all the hurdles and educate himself like a normal person in spite of his disability.

Life was not easy for Abu. He had to travel to Mumbai for a small job at a tailoring shop. However, this became the turning point in his life. It was the golden touch that kindled the sleeping genius. He took training in tailoring and saved money to open a shop in his hometown. Later he expanded it with a loan from NHFDC \& SISI under the guidance of AYJNISHD(D), Regional Center, Kolkata. Abu was slowly gaining grip over the reins of his life. His wide acceptance in the India International Trade Fair in the year 2006 brought him name and recognition. Abu came back home with his harvest - a certificate of merit and prize from the Hon'ble Minister, Mrs. Meira Kumar. If the 2006 fair showered fame, the fair at Haryana in 2007 brought him wealth. Today, Abu has a roaring readymade garment and toy factory at Barasat, which helps to light the hearth of 22 homes. Among these 22 fellow workers 4 are hearing impaired like Abu.

So, here is a young boy who could be a role model for others. Abu recollects poignantly the help which he received at AYJNISHD(D), Regional Center, Kolkata, while he was pursuing computer training programme. This training helped him a lot. Now he can make computer designing for his garment products and also he is in contact with other readymade garment firms in India \& abroad using Internet. The staff of AYJNISHD(D) extended their hands when he was groping for help. However, today Abu has anchored himself firmly and is looking forward to do something for the handicapped and weaker section of the society. He dreams to provide more opportunity for people like him and in near future Abu is planning to join Indian Sign Language Cell of AYJNISHD(D), to improve communication and productivity in his small industrial set up.

## 9. ACTIVITIES IN NORTH EASTERN REGION

During the year 2018-19 following activities were undertaken for the empowerment of persons with disabilities in the North Eastern Region of the country. Shri R. Bhattacharya, Rehabilitation Officer and Head, Dept. of Socio-Economic Rehabilitation was the Nodal Officer of the North Eastern Programme.

### 9.1 Strategic Plan for the North-Eastern States

AYJNISHD(D) in collaboration with Govt. of Meghalaya (Office of the Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities, Dept. of Social Welfare and State Resource Center (SRC) on Disability Affairs) organized the National Seminar on 'Strategic Plan For Rehabilitation of Persons With Disabilities in North-Eastern States' on $30^{\text {th }}$ and $31^{\text {st}}$ August, 2018 at the State Convention Center, Shillong in Meghalaya state. The programme was attended by 151 Officials from National Institutes, State Govt. Officials from 8 North Eastern States and NGO Executives.


Smt. Dolly Chakrabarty IAS, Joint Secretary to the Govt. of India, Dept. of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, New Delhi delivered the keynote address as special invitee and highlighted the significance of capacity building of Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) through Early Identification and Intervention, Education and Skill Training. Shri T. Dkhar , IAS, Commissioner \& Secretary, Social Welfare Dept. Govt. of Meghalaya delivered Welcome Address.Shri H. Marwein, IAS,

Additional Chief Secretary, Dept. of Social Welfare, Govt. of Meghalaya was the Special Invitee. In his address, he emphasized close collaboration between State Govt., Govt. of India and non-Govt. organizations in delivering the services to persons with disabilities.

### 9.2 Diagnostic \& Fitment Camp

During the reporting year, the Institute organized diagnostic and fitment camp at Tinsukia and Sadiya, in Assam on $29^{\text {th }}$ and $30^{\text {th }}$ August 2018. 77 persons benefitted from this camp and 35 hearing aids were distributed to 23 persons with hearing impairment.

### 9.3 Support to NGOs

AYJNISHD (D) has laid special emphasis in initiating developmental activities for Persons with Disabilities in North-Eastern Region for the last 3 years. During the year under report, AYJNISHD(D) has provided the following support to the organizations working for the persons with disabilities in North-Eastern Region in order to improve the infrastructural facilities for rehabilitation services of Persons with Disabilities with special reference to Persons with Hearing Disability.

### 9.3.1 Clinical Equipments

The Institute is providing Audiological and Speech Diagnostic equipment along with books for Mini Library to the State Govt. or organizations recommended by the State Govt. for the last 3 years. Till date, 44 organizations are assisted with equipment and 59 organizations are assisted with Mini Library through such initiative.

### 9.3.2 Job Linked Training Centers

As a part of developmental activities in the North-Eastern Region, AYJNISHD(D) has established 8 Model Job-Linked Training Centers (one in each State) by way of providing 10 Computers, 10 Monitors, 10 Computer Tables and Chairs and two Printers to following each organization duly recommended by the State Govt.

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## 10. Training Center for the Adult Deaf (TCAD)

AYJNISHD(D) initiated Inclusive Technical Training Programme for the persons with hearing disability by relocating TCAD at Boys Town, Hyderabad in the year 2003 with the approval of Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India. The TCAD-Boys Town collaborated training Center is one of the biggest inclusive technical training facilities for the deaf in India. Every year trainees with hearing disability undergo ITI training in an inclusive setup. Job placement of trainees has been good in different public and private sectors.

Apart from main Trade Training, socially useful work is made compulsory for every student to undergo on rotation program; in the gardening, cooking, security, cleaning campus and other services. It is reducing differences and encouraging adjustability. Out of class activities have affected all domains of life such as cognitive, emotional, social, moral, cultural and aesthetic. It is enabling the students to learn to work as a team and to work with skill and deftness.

All the above activities are the same for the deaf who are integrated into the mainstream. We can proudly state that Boys Town has been maintaining a high level of commitment. The Joint work of AYJNISHD (D) and Boys Town is considered as first largest Collaborative Programme for the Deaf in Asia and second-largest in the World; towards a common end of training the deaf in the Trade Courses under the Craftsmen Training Scheme in the pattern of NCVT and with job placements. The project has been successful and almost all the passed out deaf trainees are shown employment every year in both public and private sector organizations.

During the reporting year trade wise trainees undergoing training are : Fitter - 21, Turner - 16, Welder -6 and Carpenter -16 , totaling 59 candidates. Number of trainees admitted, passed out and employed during the last five years is given below.

## 11. OFFICIAL LANGUAGE IMPLEMENTATION

## Brief description about implementation of Official Language during the year 2018-19

- During the year under report 635 and 1827 letters were issued in Hindi and English respectively. Total 304 documents were issued in bilingual under Official Language Act, 1963 Section 3 (3).
- Meetings of Official Language Implementation Committee of the Institute were held during the reporting year on 27.6.2018, 24.09.2018 and 20.12.2018.
- Hindi week was observed by the staff with enthusiasm from 14th to 21st September, 2018. 14th September Hindi Day was celebrated by organizing a special programme for staff \& students. This programme was conducted mainly for staff to know the importance of official language and to pay the attention towards the message received from the Ministry of Home Affairs. The Director of the Institute said that every employee should do their day to day official work in Hindi and ensure the compliance of Official Language Policy. On this occasion - quiz competition for staff and student was taken and winners awarded by cash prizes. During the week Hindi section had organized various competitions, such as Hindi noting \& drafting, elocution, Hindi vartani and poem recital followed by the prize distribution ceremony.
- In order to promote the use of Official Language, to train the staff \& update their working knowledge of Hindi including Hindi software skills, in addition, various applications for voice typing, Unicode, Google translation, Hindi typing facility can be made available by downloading the Microsoft Indic language tools, workshop on which were held twice on 09/05/2018 and 15/03/2019. 25 staff members participated in the both the workshops. The programme benefitted all the participants.


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- During the reporting year 21 reports were submitted on progressive use of Hindi/Official Language Implementation which are the monthly, quarterly, yearly, action taken/compliance, Hindi Salahkar Samittee reports to the Govt. of India, Official Language Dept., Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment, Ministry of Home Affairs, Regional Office, Official Language Dept. Navi Mumbai and Town Official Language Implementation Committee, North Mumbai.
- On behalf of the Institute one TOLIC meeting was attended by Hindi Officer on 28/06/2018.TOLIC meeting was coordinated by office of the Development Commissioner, SEEPZ-Special Economic Zone, Ministry of Commerce \& Industry, Andheri (E), Mumbai-400 096. Follow up action/Implementation is under way as per decisions/directives given in the TOLIC meeting.
- A brief write-up on Hindi department's activities /Official Language implementation was given for the Institute's new website.
- Developed a bilingual glossary (Administrative terms \& phrases) for day to day official use of the Hindi and distributed to all Depts. / Sections, RCs \& CRCs.
- Four magazines are being subscribed for creation of sound Hindi knowledge.
- During the reporting year, following translation, typing, corrections/modifications and proof reading work was executed by the Hindi section.

Besides, co-ordination, evaluation and monitoring of such directives and programmes contained in such orders and guidelines, SC/ST Cell is fully and actively engaged in getting reservation policy of the Government implemented by AYJNISHD(D) throughout the year. Dr. Arun Banik, Reader and Head, Dept. of Outreach and Extension Services is nominated as Liaison Officer of the Cell. The activities of the Cell for the period are enumerated as under-

- Implementation of reservation during admission to all the courses run by AYJNISHD(D).
- Admission to SC/ST students in both girls and boys hostel given on priority.
- Reservation in appointment in $\mathrm{A}, \mathrm{B}$ and C group posts.
- Implementation of reservation in quarter allotment.
- Committee constituted by the Institute updated the SC/ST roster.
- Roster implemented for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) including admission to courses run by this Institute and Regional centers, Composite Regional Centers.
- Implementation of facilities provided by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India to SC/ST/PwD students at this Institute.


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## Further the following activities were also done by the SC/ST Cell during 2018-19

- Organized Jayanti of Bharatratna Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar at the Institute for all the staff and students and the family members residing in the residential complex of AYJNISHD(D).
- Organized Punyatithi of Bharatratna Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar as Mahaparinirvan Diwas at the Institute and paid homage to the great Indian Socialist Leader.
- A roster committee has been formed to examine the Institute roster and recast the updated roster for proper implementation of reservation policy having external members and Dr. Arun Banik, Head, Department of Outreach \& Extension Services as Liaison Officer of SC/ST.


### 12.3 Vigilance Cell

The Placement Cell aims at creating an interface between the world of employment and the trainee students thereby serving to be mutually beneficial. During the reporting year the cell received 23 vacancy advertisements from various Schools, Institutes, NGOs and Recruiting Agencies. These requests were circulated through notice board and website display. In addition to that, there were two requests for campus interviews for the job placements. Total eight candidates were appointed in various organisations through these placements requests. Ms. Sadhana Relekar, Lecturer, Dept. of Speech Lang. Pathology was nominated as Placement Officer.

### 12.6 Vayoshree Yojana

On 26th April, 2018, during his visit to AYJNISHD(D), the Hon'ble Union Minister for Social Justice and Empowerment Shri Thaawar Chand Gehlot launched the 'Vayoshree Yojana' for the welfare of below-povertyline senior citizens, to benefit 5.2 lakh senior citizens in three years.


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AYJNISHD(D) is implementing 'Vayoshree Scheme' with the collaboration of ALIMCO, Kanpur. On this occasion, the Hon'ble Union Minister launched Vayoshree Yojana, a 'Scheme for providing physical Aids and Assisted-living Devices for Senior Citizens belonging to BPL category'. The assistive devices provided under this scheme help Senior Citizens to overcome their age-related physical impairment and lead a dignified and productive life with minimal dependence on caregivers or other members of the family.

### 12.7 Yoga Meditation Center

## 13. Composite Regional Center for Persons with Disabilities (CRCPWD), Bhopal

### 13.1 Introduction:

Composite Regional Center (CRC), Bhopal is a service model initiated by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment, Govt. of India, established on $14^{\text {th }}$ August, 2000. The center building is barrier free and is built on land measuring 4.0 acres and its plinth area is 1569 sq.mt. The center is functioning under the administrative control of Ali Yavar Jung National
 Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan), Mumbai, since February, 2006.

CRC, Bhopal is established with the purpose to create infrastructure required for training and manpower development, research and providing medical, therapeutic, special educational and rehabilitation services to all categories of disabled in those parts of the country where such infrastructure is lacking. The center has officials from the following discipline to undertake and execute the activities :
i. Occupational Therapy
ii. Orientation \& Mobility
iii. Physical Medicine \& Rehabilitation
iv. Physiotherapy \& Prosthetics \& Orthotics
v. Psychology
vi. Special Education
vii. Speech \& Hearing

## 14. Composite Regional Center for Persons with Disabilities (CRCPWD), Odhav, Ahmedabad

The CRC, Ahmedabad, Gujarat was established on 16th August, 2011 and is functioning under the administrative control of AYJNISHD(D). At present it is functioning in the building allotted by the Govt. of Gujarat. Land has been acquired by CRC and building plan is sanctioned. First installment of funds has already been paid to CPWD for undertaking the construction. Similar to CRC, Bhopal, CRC, Ahmedabad has professionals from different disciplines to undertake and execute various clinical
 activities.

### 14.2 Long Term Training Programmes

CRC, Ahmedabad conducted D. Ed. Sp. Edn. (MR) course of two years duration affiliated to RCI, New Delhi. During the reporting year 23 students were enrolled for this course.

### 14.3 Short Term Training Programmes

During the reporting year two training programmes were conducted. One was Parent Training Programme in which 28 parents attended the programme and another one was Disability Awareness Programme for college students in which 76 students were benefitted.


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### 14.4 Services:

During the reporting year, the CRC, Ahmedabad served 1099 new clients, 5428 follow up clients and 15614 support services provided at the Center and through camps. The Center distributed/fitted 271 aids/ appliances to 154 beneficiaries. The details of the camps conducted by the center during the reporting year is given below -

These financial statements include the accounts of the Institute's Regional Centers at Noida, Kolkata, Janla (Odisha), Secunderabad and TCAD Hyderabad. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.
2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller\& Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules and Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any are reported through Inspection Reports/ CAG's Audit Reports separately.
3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

## 4. Based on our audit, we report that:

i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for our audit
ii The Balance Sheet, Income \& Expenditure Account and Receipt \&Payment Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by the Government of India (Ministry of Finance).
iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Institute as required under Bye-laws insofar as it appears from our examination of such books.
iv. We further report that:

## A. BALANCE SHEET

## A. 1 Liabilities

## A.1.1 Current Liabilities \& Provisions (Sch.7) Rs. 2.31 crore

The amount of Rs. 10.71 lakh recovered by Kolkata and Janla Regional Centers under ADIP scheme was shown under Current Liabilities instead of Earmarked Funds. This has resulted in overstatement of Current Liabilities and Provisions and understatement of Earmarked Fund by Rs. 10.71 lakh each.

## A. 2 Assets

## A.2.1 Fixed Assets (Sch.-8) Rs. 13.93 crore

The Institute capitalized the annual maintenance expenditure of Rs. 29.87 lakh as Capital work in Progress under Fixed Assets (Sch.-8) on the basis of misconstruing the expenditure as repairing work of Construction Project instead of treating the same as revenue expenditure. This has resulted in overstatement of Capital WIP by Rs. 29.87 lakh and understatement of expenditure to the same extent.

## B. Income \& Expenditure Account

## B. 1 Expenditure

B.1.1 The Institute has not provided for bills received upto March 2019 amounting to Rs. 3.29 lakh in respect of expenditure out of CSR fund. Similarly, in respect of Cochlear Implant, the Institute has not provided for Bills received upto March 2019 amounting to Rs. 56.21 lakh. Further, in the Regional Center, Janla provision for Rs. 2.09 lakh for outstanding expenses paid in April \& May 2019 was not made. Thus nonprovision for expenses of the current year resulted in understatement of Expenditure and Current Liabilities by Rs. 61.59 lakh each and consequentially Excess of Income over Expenditure was overstated to the same extent.

## C. General Comments

1. The Uniform format of accounts for Central Autonomous Bodies state that the provision for retirement benefits is to be made on actuarial basis. The Institute has not made provision for retirement benefits in contravention with Uniform format of Accounts.
2. An amount of Rs. 9.28 lakh was recoverable from Apang Jeevan Vikas Sanstha, Amravati and Bharti Jute and Silai Kala training Center Society, Bhopal (Rs. 2.40 lakh \& Rs. 6.88 lakh respectively) as unspent balance under SIPDA. These amounts were not included in the unspent balance of Rs. 29.60 lakh (Sch.3) shown under SIPDA.

## AYJNISHD(D)

3. The Institute has shown Rs. 3.83 crore as outstanding advance (Deposit Work) to CPWD under Capital Work in progress as on $31^{\text {st }}$ March 2019 [Sch.8(B) HO Mumbai Account]. However, Expenditure Statement upto March 2019 received from CPWD shows only Rs. 2.57 crore as outstanding. Moreover, the year wise details of old deposit/advances to CPWD was shown as Rs. 2.85 Crore which needs reconciliation with outstanding advance shown in the accounts as well as expenditure statement submitted by CPWD.
4. As per the instruction for preparation of Schedule 13 of the prescribed Uniform format, grants received for general purpose are only to be booked under this schedule. Addition to Building (Plan) under Fixed Assets of Rs. 3.60 crore was booked under Income \& Expenditure (Sch.13) as 'GIA- Capital'. The procedure adopted was not in compliance to the instructions contained in Uniform Format of Accounts.
5. Details of bank accounts as seen from the details furnished by the Institute reflects 5 saving bank accounts which were non operative since 2003-04 to 14.03.2017 amounting to Rs. 59.90 lakh.
6. There are two Composite Regional Centers (CRCs) under the administrative control of AYJNISHD, Head Office viz. CRC Bhopal and CRC, Ahmedabad which started functioning with effect from August 2000 and August 2011 respectively. Though the Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment vide letter dated 07.08.2017 has instructed the Institute to present the annual accounts of CRCs invariably along with the accounts of the Institute to audit for certification as the CRCs being an extended arms of the National Institute, the accounts of CRCs were not incorporated in the Institute's accounts for want of clarification from the Ministry.
7. The rate of depreciation adopted for computer and library books were not as per Income Tax rates prescribed in Uniform Format of Accounts.

## D. Grant in Aid

Out of Grant-in Aid of Rs. 43.14 crore (including unspent balance of Rs. 2.20 crore of the previous year as per SAR and SIPDA Rs. 2.63 crore), the Institute utilized Rs. 43.05 crore including utilization under SIPDA during the year and after adjusting the internally generated income of Rs. 4.30 crore [ $4.27 \mathrm{cr}+$ 0.03 cr ], the unutilized grant was Rs. 4.39 crore as on $31^{\text {st }}$ March 2019. However, the Utilization Certificate reflects unspent balance as Rs. 3.13 crore [2.83+0.30] which needs to be reconciled.

In respect of ADIP, the Institute received Grant-in-aid of Rs. 6.60 crore, Beneficiary Recovery of Rs. 41.63 lakh and interest of Rs. 7.94 lakh during the year, and the Institute had an unspent balance of grant carried forward from the previous year amounting to Rs. 3.50 crore (total Rs. 10.60 crore),the Institute utilized a sum of Rs. 4.47 crore leaving an unspent balance of Rs. 6.13 crore. However, the Utilization Certificate reflects unspent balance as Rs. 5.00 crore.

## E. Management letter

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan), through a Management Letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet and the Income \& Expenditure Account/Receipt \& Payment Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in the Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:
(a) In so far as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan), as on $31^{\text {st }}$ March 2019: and
(b) In so far as it relates to the Income \& Expenditure Account, of the surplus for the year ended on that date.

## COMMENTS ON ACCOUNTS

## A. BALANCE SHEET

## A. 1 Liabilities

## A.1.1. Current Liabilities \& Provisions (Sch.7) Rs. 2.31 Crore

An amount of Rs. 2.59 lakh of RC, Kolkata and Rs. 8.13 lakh of RC, Janla has been shown under Current Liabilities of the respective RCs. Since the amount is not received to the Head Office, in the year 2018-19, the same is recorded in the Accounts in 2019-20. Para may be dropped.

## A. 2 Assets

## A.2.1 Fixed Assets (Sch-8) Rs.13.93 Crore

The amount of Rs. 29,86,919/- as advance to CPWD for annual maintenance, repairs \& painting work has been considered in Capital Assets. As per the decision of Review Meeting of NIs held on 21/03/2016 that repair works, wired work etc. should be made out of Capital Head and not from General Head. A copy is enclosed herewith. (Annexure I). Para may be dropped.

## B. Income \& Expenditure Account

## B. 1 Expenditure

1. The bills pertaining to Rs. $56,20,979 /-$ and Rs. 3.24 lakh though we have received but not approved by competent authority before $31 / 03 / 2019$. Since the bills are not approved, we have not made any provision for this bills. This bills were accounted in the year 2019-20. Further Cochlear Implant is maintain under ADIP Scheme which is already shown as an earmarked fund under schedule 3 making provision for utilization of this fund will again add to liability. Para may be dropped.
2. The bills pertaining to Rs. 2.09 lakh for Regional Center, Janla through we have received but not approved by competent authority before 31/03/2019. Since the bills are not approved, we have not made any provision for this bills. This bills were accounted in the year 2019-20. In view of this Para may be dropped.

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## C. General Comments

1. The Institute is a non-profit organization working under the direction and the grants provided by the Govt. of India, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment. It is not a commercial organization and hence all the accounting standards not applicable to the Institute.

Annual budget is prepared in respect of Revenue expenditure in terms of salaries, gratuity, pension payable to the employees during the year is approved by the Ministry and the grants are released. There is no specific Budget Estimate approval for provision of Retirement Benefits payable in future as per actuarial valuation.

The retirement benefits / pensions has been reflected in the Budget Estimate during the year and the same was approved in Executive Council / General Council under the Pay Allowance / Pension. Para may be dropped.
2. The Institute has taken up the matter with the respective agencies for recovery of the said amount. However, due to contingencies of recoverability of the amount the same has not been accounted in the books. The same will be recorded as and when the funds will be actually received from the agencies. Para may be dropped.
3. The difference appearing in CPWD statement and in our books will be reconciled on receipt of final statement from CPWD.
Para may be dropped.
4. The Capital Grants are accounted under Schedule 3 Earmarked Fund. Only the amount actually utilized is accounted in schedule 13. The unspent balance is shown under schedule 3 . Since the amount is actually utilized has to be recognized as income and hence the amount is transferred to schedule 13 under grant and ultimately credit to corpus account
Para may be dropped.
5. The non-operative accounts pertains to few specific earmarked fund. Since, these funds are not utilized the saving accounts is also became non-operative. We will utilize these funds in the current financial year.
Para may be dropped
6. The accounts of the Institute are prepared as per the guideline and approval of the Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment in respect of Consolidation of Accounts of CRC Bhopal and CRC Ahmedabad alongwith the accounts of the Institute, we have referred to the Ministry vide our letter No. A/2018$19 / 5719$ dated $14 / 01 / 2019$. The reply from the Ministry is awaited as and when the clarification received, we will comply with the same. Para may be dropped.
7. The Institute is not following the rate prescribed under IT Act. The Institute following our own policy for providing of depreciation on Assets. The same has been disclosed in the Accounting Policies and attached to the Financial Statement. Para may be dropped

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## D. Grant in Aid

The opening unspent amount of grant was Rs.1.54 crore only as against Rs. 2.20 crore as mentioned in Audit Para. Further CSR grant is also include in the Audit Para. However, CSR grant is a separate received from other entities are separately spent and are accounted in the books. The same has not been considered in preparation of utilization certificate. The actual unspent amount as on 31/03/2019 is Rs. 3.13 crore only. The statement is enclosed for your perusal. (Annexure II)

In respect of ADIP grant, the opening unspent amount of grant was Rs. 2.38 crore only as against Rs. 3.50 crore as mentioned in Audit Para. Hence, there is no difference and the unspent amount on 31/03/2019 is Rs. 5.00 crore only. The statement is enclosed for your perusal. (Annexure III) Para may be dropped.

## E. Management letter

1. Upto the year 2017-18 the Institute was following the policy of Accounting CSR Fund as Liability and shown under Sch 07 Current Liabilities. The actual amount utilized out of the CSR Fund to the beneficiaries were reduced from the Current Liability and the net liability has been shown in the financial statement.

As per the recommendation of C\& AG from the year 2018-19 the Institute has changed its accounting policy for treating the corpus fund received as Grant and disclosed under schedule 13. The corresponding utilization of the fund was shown under Schedule 22 Object of the Trust.

Since it's change in accounting policy the corresponding unutilized balance of the fund as on $31^{\text {tt }}$ March 2018 was also been treated as Income in Schedule 13.

The receipt and payment account shows only the amount actually received/paid during the year. Accordingly Rs. 34.85 lakh has been shown under current year receipt under CSR Income being the amount actually received in the year 2018-19. The net amount of Rs. 2.88 lakh as explained below was received in the year 2017-18. Hence, the same was not appearing in the receipt and payment account. Further as regard booking of only Rs 3.23 crore as income as against the total grant receipt of Rs 3.59 crore (2017-18) and Rs 0.35 crore (2018-19) we would like to state that, out of Rs 3.59 crore for the year 2017-18 an amount of Rs 0.71 crore was already utilized in 2017-18 itself and accounted in the year 2017-18. The remaining unutilized amount of Rs 2.88 crore as on $31^{\text {st }}$ March 2018 has been transferred to income in the year 2018-19, thus the total of Rs 2.88 crore plus Rs 0.35 crore i.e total Rs 3.23 crore has been booked as income. Para may be dropped.
2. The interest earned in respect of Cochlear Implant shown under Schedule 17. The same will be considered under ADIP - Cochlear Implant from the next year.
Para may be dropped.

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3. The Cochlear Implant are dispatched by ALIMCO to Institute for supply to the hospitals for surgery. There are no payment involved for Cochlear Implant by the Institute. The Institute is only implementing agency and custodian of implant received under ADIP Scheme.

The Institute has maintained proper record for Cochlear Implant received, the Implants send to various hospitals for implant to the beneficiary and the unutilized implants available with the Institute. The Stores Department keep the total control of these stock and keep the custody of the stocks available. Para may be dropped.

1. Since there is no separate capital grants are received for ADIP, the small Capital expenditure incurred for purchase of cupboards and computers are shown as revenue expenditure under the ADIP activities. Para may be dropped.
2. The Institute has only changed the procedure for remittance of GPF funds to the Trust account. There is no change in the accounting policy. Hence the same has not been disclosed in the accounts separately.

Further Audit comments: In view of reply, para may be retained.
A.1.2 This does not include Rs. 15.52 lakh being excess depreciation charged on items (Equipments, Furniture \& Fixture, Library Books, Office equipments, Buildings). This resulted in understatement of fixed assets by Rs. 15.52 lakh and overstatement of Expenditure (Depreciation) by same amount.

## A.2. Current Assets, Loan \& Advances (Schedule-11) - Rs.2.38 crore

This does not include Rs. 0.53 lakh being security deposit held with Madhya Pradesh Madhya Kshetra Vidyut Vitran Company Ltd. This resulted in understatement of Current Assets, Loans \& Advances as well as Corpus/Capital Fund by Rs. 0.53 lakh.

## Comments on Accounts of the Composite Regional Center (CRC), Odhav, Ahmedabad for the Year 2018-19.

The Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment, Government of India has established National Institutes in each major area of disability.

The Composite Regional Center (CRC) Ahmedabad has been established on $16^{\text {th }}$ August 2011, under the administrative control of Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan) Mumbai, an autonomous body under the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India.

## Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan)

The Ali Yavar Jung National Institute of Speech and Hearing Disabilities (Divyangjan) was established on $9^{\text {th }}$ August 1983 under the Societies Registration Act. 1860. The Institute has been established for manpower development, research, clinical and therapeutic services, outreach and extension services for the persons with hearing disabilities.

The Institute is responsible for development of manpower by undertaking or sponsoring the training of trainees and Teachers, Employment Officers, Psychologists, Vocational Counselors and such other personnel as may be deemed necessary by the Institute for promoting the education, training and rehabilitation of the hearing handicapped. The Institute sponsors. coordinates and subsidizes research into all aspects of the education and rehabilitation of the hearing handicapped. It is also developing model services for rehabilitation of the hearing handicapped.

We have conducted our audit u/s 20(1) of the CAG's DPC Act in accordance with auditing Standards generally accepted in India. Based on our audit. we have following comment on accounts of CRC, Odhav Ahmedabad for the period 2018-19.

## 1. Balance Sheet: Fixed Assets Rs. 1.61 crore

As per letter No. JMN/162011/1138/G dated 2/05/2011 \& 6/06/2011 of Revenue Department. Govt of Gujarat and Order No. B/J-I/K/7689,11 dated 06/06/2011 of District Magistrate \& Collector Ahmedabad, Govt of Gujarat, a land measuring 8715 sq. mts ( 2.15 acre) from total 14366 sq. mts at City Survey no.386, Taluka City, Odhav, Ahmedabad was handed over to the Ministry of Social Justice \& Empowerment, Govt. of India, New Delhi, for the purpose of establishing a Composite Regional Center (C.R.C.)

In due course, the CRC through Voucher No. CRC/CB/142 to 163 dated 25/02/2019 paid Rs. 2.04 crore to Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation (AMC) towards conversion charges of the land.

According to significant accounting policies (Para 5.1 of schedule-24) of Report of the committee of experts on uniform formats of accounts for Central Autonomous Bodies, Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition inclusive of inward fright, duties and taxes and incidental and direct expenses related to acquisition.

However, audit noticed that an amount of Rs 2.04 crore paid for conversion charges by the CRC has been charged to Income \& Expenditure instead of capitalizing the same under fixed assets.

Thus, non-inclusion of amount of Rs. 2.04 crore paid for conversion charges in the Fixed Assets has resulted in understatement of Fixed Assets and overstatement of expenditure by Rs 2.04 crore.

On this being pointed out the CRC, Ahmedabad replied that this Center has paid to Ahmedabad Municipal Commissioner towards Conversion charges Fees, hence not included in Fixed Assets.

Conversion charges paid to Ahmedabad Municipal Commissioner was a part of Fixed Assets and deed to be included in the Major head of Fixed Assets in the balance sheet.

Further compliance is awaited.

## 2. Balance Sheet:

## Fixed Assets (Schedule-8): Rs. 160.83 lakh

This include Rs 152.72 lakh as CWIP which was given to CPWD as an advance during the period 2015-16 for construction of building for CRC Ahmedabad in the premises of Bhikshuk Gruh Odhav, Ahmedabad. Construction of building has not started till date (July 2019).

The CRC has shown this amount as CWIP instead of Advance to CPWD and Corpus/capital fund has been created with the similar amount.

This has resulted in overstatement of Fixed Assets: CWIP by Rs 152.72 lakh and understatement of Current Assets, Loans and Advances to the same extent.

On this being pointed out the CRC, Ahmedabad replied that as per the norms of CPWD for the Deposit Work, An amount of Rs. 152.72 Lakh has been deposited as $1^{\text {st }}$ Instalment to CPWD. The CPWD is sending monthly Utilization certificate in the format of Form-65. However, the construction work of CRC Building is yet to start. The annual account of this Center is being prepared at our Head Quarters i.e AY JNISHD(D), Mumbai, hence this will be brought to the knowledge of Head Quarter office, Mumbai.

Further compliance is awaited.

## 3. Income and Expenditure Account

## Income

## Interest Earned (Schedule 17): Rs. 2.78 Lakh

This includes interest earned on the unutilised amount of earmarked fund received for specific purpose during 2018-19.

As per Practice Note issued (October 2017) by the CAG of India on Financial Attest Audit of Autonomous Bodies, interest earned on Investment made out of the earmarked fund are to be credited to the fund.

## AYJNISHD(D)

CRC, Odhav received ( $6^{\text {th }}$ Feb 2019) GIA of Rs. 2.04 crore for Conversion charges of Land which paid to Ahmedabad Municipal Corporation on $1^{\text {st }}$ March 2019 and received ( $30^{\text {th }}$ March 2019) Rs. 3.10 crore for construction of Building of CRC Ahmedabad which was not deposited with CPWD till $31^{\text {st }}$ March 2019. Further, CRC Odhav also received ( $22^{\text {nd }}$ May 2018) Rs. 5.40 lakh for Skill Development Programme out of which Rs. 4.08 lakh was lying unspent till $31^{\text {st }}$ March 2019.

CRC Odhav kept all the fund in a single Saving Account along with other recurring grant and earned interest of Rs. 2.78 lakh during 2018-19.

Audit observed that CRC Odhav shows all interest income as income of the CRC and did not credit the interest earned of specific grant in their specific heads. Further, the audit could not quantify the interest amount due to non-maintenance of separate account for specific grant.

On this being pointed out CRC, Odhav replied that the matter will be brought to the notice of our headquarter Mumbai.

## 3. Preparation of Schedule 8 in incorrect format

As per Uniform Format of Accounts for Central Autonomous bodies, Schedule 8 pertaining to Fixed Assets should consist of Gross block of assets (Cost/valuation at the beginning of the year, addition during the year and deduction during the year), depreciation (as at the beginning of the year, on addition during the year, on deduction during the year and total up to the year end) and Net block (as at the current year end and as at previous year end).

It was noticed that CRC has not prepared the schedule 8 as per Uniform Format of Accounts and has not disclosed the gross block of Assets, depreciation for the year provided and net block of Assets for the current year as well as previous year.

In the absence of correct data about Gross block of Fixed assets, audit could not verify the correctness and completeness of depreciation for provided for the year 2018-19.

On this being pointed out the CRC, Ahmedabad replied that the annual account of this Center is being prepared at our Head Quarter i.e. AYJNISHD(D), Mumbai, hence this will be brought to the knowledge of Headquarter office.

Further compliance is awaited.
